Town election shows few surprises

Kenneth Sharp received 271 votes in the April 2 election for town president in Chatsworth, with Janet Honegger polling 291 votes for town clerk. Neither had opposition. Curtis Stoller received 275 votes for town trustee, with James Livingston polling 248 and Keith Miller 230 in successful bids for seats as trustees. Charles Elliott, an incumbent, received 147 votes and was not elected. Millard Maxson received 305 votes for a two-year term as town trustee, with Teresa Lowery receiving 295. Both were elected. In the CAPS park district, Albert Bryant received 439 votes, Jerry Birkenbell 433, and James Diller 413, with all being elected. In Chatsworth township elections, Tom Livingston was elected supervisor with 327

votes. For clerk, Charles Power polled 334. For highway commissioner, Neil Hornickel polled 323. All were unopposed. For township trustees, all four candidates were elected. Harold Aberle received 363, Don Lowery 342, Ken Rich 334, and Jim McGreal 321. For library trustee, with four to be elected, two names appeared on the ballot. Suzanne Coventry received 320 votes, while Don Gibb polled 316. The county clerk's office did not have the write-in votes canvassed at press time. In the vote to increase the road and bridge tax in Chatsworth township, the proposition failed 122-245.

High school athletes feted at Legion April 9

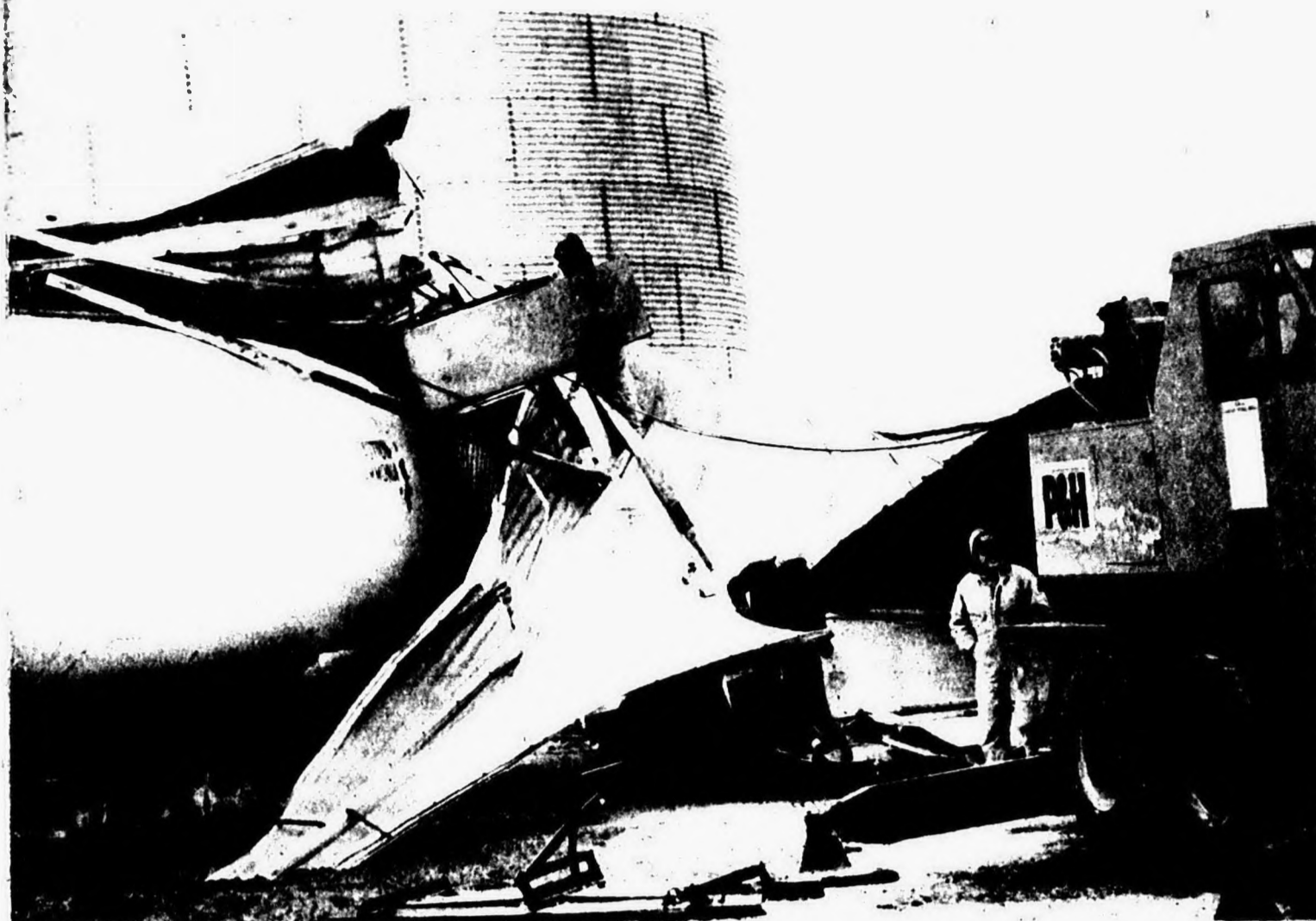

FFA judges 'on a streak'

The Chatsworth FFA livestock judges have been busy participating in contests the last several weekends. At Danville Junior College the team placed first in swine, beef, and overall reasons in both the 4-H and FFA divisions. Mike Miller was high individual. Keith Wilken placed third, Ann Krones seventh and Ron Durre, 11th. The team consisting of Krones, Miller, Durre, and Wilken had another successful day at Lakeland Junior college in Mattoon. The team placed first in beef, second in swine, third in sheep, and first in oral reasons. Wilken was high individual overall and first in sheep. Durre placed first in beef. Miller was second in reasons, followed by Krones, third; Durre, fourth; and Wilken, eighth. Sophomores Darrin Belousek, David Lindquist, and Randy Ashman participated at Lakeland also, placing 11th among the 40 teams and 188 individuals at the contest.

Bayston received first in beef, second in sheep, and fourth overall. The senior Chatsworth judges—Wilken, Krones, Miller and Durre—were third team overall. Miller was third individual, while Belousek was sixth and Wilken seventh. The Chatsworth senior judges received another honor, winning the National Hampshire swine picture judging competition. Durre received a high individual score of 348 out of a possible 350. The sophomores, consisting of Mike Moody, Steve Quint, Ashman, Lindquist and Tom Franey tied for second in the Hampshire contest.
