

## Board Reviews Repair, Discipline

At the Board of Education meeting Monday evening it was decided to change the telephone at crosses held at Chatsworth High School Friday, June 3. A new hot water storage tank will be purchased at the high school to replace the old one which is leaking.

Summer repairs planned, include sanding and sealing grade school gym floor, work on floors in high school gym, cafeteria and study hall, and painting trim on elementary building.

The Quarterback Club has ordered an electric football scoreboard. This is to be located at the south end of the field and will entail moving the name sign of "Kibler Field."

The Board agreed to bring another part time janitor to assist with night work.

Discussion was held on the subject of detention. Some parents complain on grounds detention or keeping pupils after school, punishes parents more than the students, as the pupils miss the bus and parents busy with farm work, have to make an extra trip to town to pick up their children.

Superintendent Mever defended the system as the most effective means of discipline and pointed out parents could help by bringing pressure to bear on children to encourage better behavior and thus avoid detention.

School buses have created this problem by taking the children as soon as the dismissal bell rings, allowing no time for makeup work or disciplinary measures. Today's parents will recall when they were in school, before the advent of buses, pupils were sometimes kept for an 8th or 9th hour to make up tests or for infractions of rules. Parents then had to provide transportation to and from school every day, but now it is only in the occasional event, when the boy or girl is assigned a detention period.

Mr. Mever announced dates for "Book Power meetings" as May 19 in Springfield and May 26 at the U. of I. This committee is studying conditions and will make proposals on consolidation of many of the small schools, such as ours, into larger units.

## Watch Out For The Other Guy

**T**HE BEST WAY to drive defensively is to "Watch out for the other guy." You can't depend on that other driver to do the right thing in traffic, and there is no substitute for alertness, combined with caution and common sense. Learning to recognize his unsafe actions will enable you to gain valuable life-saving seconds when "The Other Guy" in traffic makes a mistake or does the unexpected. You may need the following clues to watch for in traffic:

**1 CARS AT THE CURB** The front wheel starts to turn. This indicates that the driver is going to pull into traffic. Will he look? Does he see you? The driver ahead has just discharged a passenger. He hasn't parked and intends to pull back into traffic. He's still talking to his passenger. Before pulling into the traffic stream, will he look back and see you approaching? The car ahead pulls up to the curb. Nine chances out of ten he will open the left front door and step into the street without looking. If that parked car at the curb has smoke coming from the exhaust, you can expect it to pull out in front of you. Look under that parked car for a pair of little

feet if it is parked near a school or playground. In all these situations slow down, honk your horn, pull slightly to the left if traffic permits, then pass cautiously.

**2 CARS AHEAD OF YOU** If you watch only that car ahead, then you have a bad habit. You must watch all cars as far ahead as you can see. This is the way professional drivers avoid being involved in "The Other Guy's" mistake. They don't wait until the driver just in front of them reacts—that may be too late!

**3 CARS APPROACHING FROM RIGHT OR LEFT** In a situation where the other car should yield to you, merge with you or stop for you—don't count on it! Remember that half of the cars in most two-car collisions had the right of way.

**4 CARS TURNING FROM WRONG LANES** That car in the right lane with its left turn signal flashing, or vice versa, needs all of your attention. The driver could be absent minded, careless, can't make up his mind what he is going to do—or he could make that turn. It's best to give him a wide berth. Don't play guessing games with him.

**5 CARS BEHIND YOU** That driver behind could drive into your trunk if you make a sudden stop without warning. Watch that rear

view mirror before making a stop. That driver behind may be day-dreaming. If you see that he is not going to stop, you may have

time to drive behind onto the shoulder and avoid that run down feeling.

### Revelry By Night

**R**EP. H. R. GROSS of Iowa has observed that, with a war in which Americans are being killed, and with the enormous problems the country is now facing it is hardly seemly that the Presidential family should convert the Smithsonian Institution into a dance hall and perform the watusi and the frug until 3 o'clock in the morning.

Exhibits were cleared from the institution's museum of history and technology, and the champagne flowed freely while the dance

band hit the beat. Mr. Gross said he was amazed and shocked that a cultural institution should be the scene of watusi capers by the Rev. Bill D. Moyers, White House spokesman, and that a lady had to be sent home because she was only half-dressed.

The lady in question posed prettily that she was wearing the latest thing—a white lace dress over a body stocking. Friends sent her home to put on a slip. Her husband thoughtfully observed that she looked sexier without it.

Mr. Gross said he thought the President and Vice President might set a more edifying example, but his remarks might be dismissed as mere partisan carping if Arthur Krock, the respected Washington commentator of the New York Times, had not said much the same thing of another party, this one in the White House, which also ran until 3 a.m.

Under the caption "The Band Played On," Mr. Krock wrote on May 1, "The spirit of revelry by night has infused what is called 'official society' in Washington to a degree not recalled by veterans here of the parties at which the 'Ins' dined and danced during the First and Second World Wars and the combat in Korea."

Mr. Krock quoted an adoring society reporter to the effect that it was all "like a surrealist dream," with "some of the wildest, most uninhibited music you ever heard . . . Luci did the frug with fiance Pat Nugent. The First Lady did the watusi . . . Vice President Humphrey (won) an accolade for his frugging."

"After all," Mr. Krock remarked with restraint, "Viet Nam is a limited war."

The letters "Plaindealer" and date "1868" are still visible over the Virginia Theatre.

AFTER THE TP&W RAILROAD moved its depot to the town hall, Sears office and the calaboose (early name for jail) still blocked the opening of Fourth Street. The calaboose was moved several hundred feet west and across Main street from where Carl Miltzard later had his business, in the stone block building the boys thought looked like Lodge City jail. There was still an argument on hand for they could open the street.

**Frost Nips Tomato Crop**  
Tomato planting will begin again this week in the Pontiac area. Frost killed 25 acres of tomato plants May 9. The abnormally late frost took the temperature down to 18 degrees early Tuesday morning. Growers tried to protect their crop with smudges of straw, corn cobs and old tires. However the attempt was unsuccessful. Thomas Ford of Chatsworth was among those whose early crop was destroyed by frost.

The growers have contracts for Campbell Soup Company. A field representative said the cold weather killed the entire tomato crop in Illinois. Farmers will begin planting again as soon as the soil is dry enough.

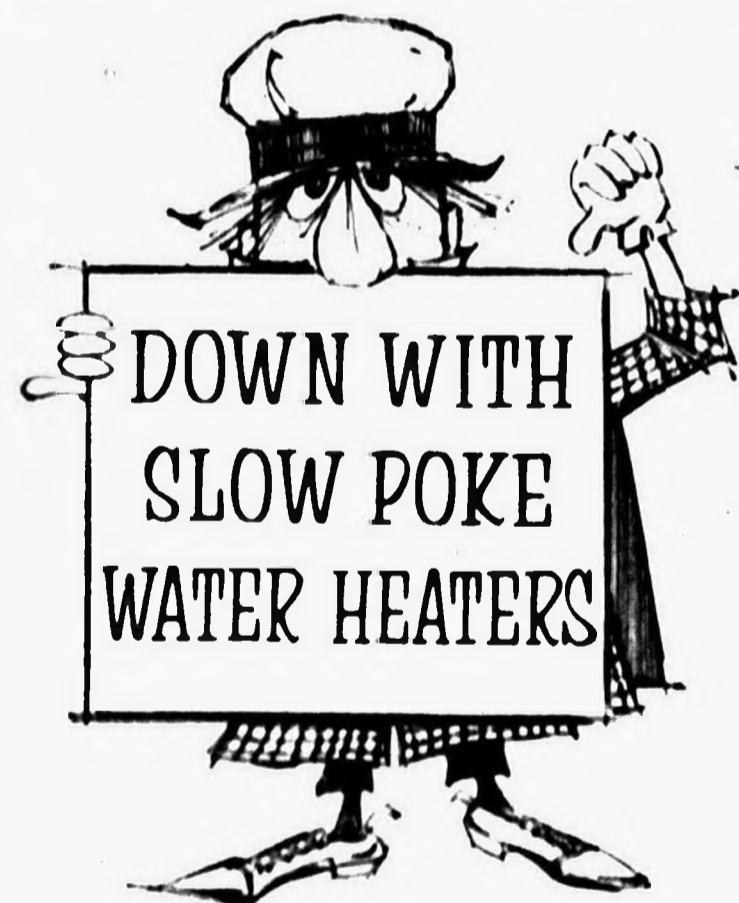

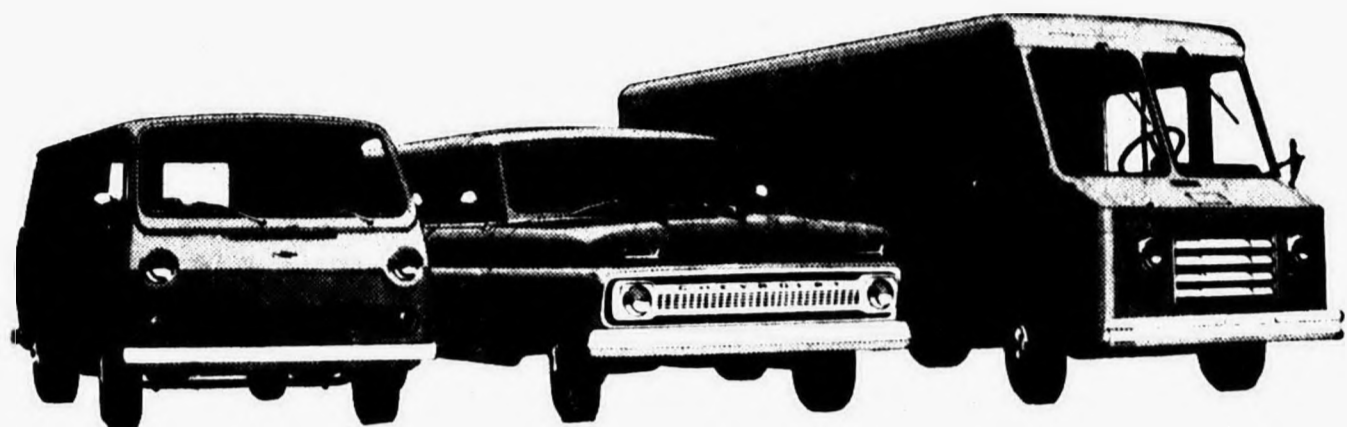
