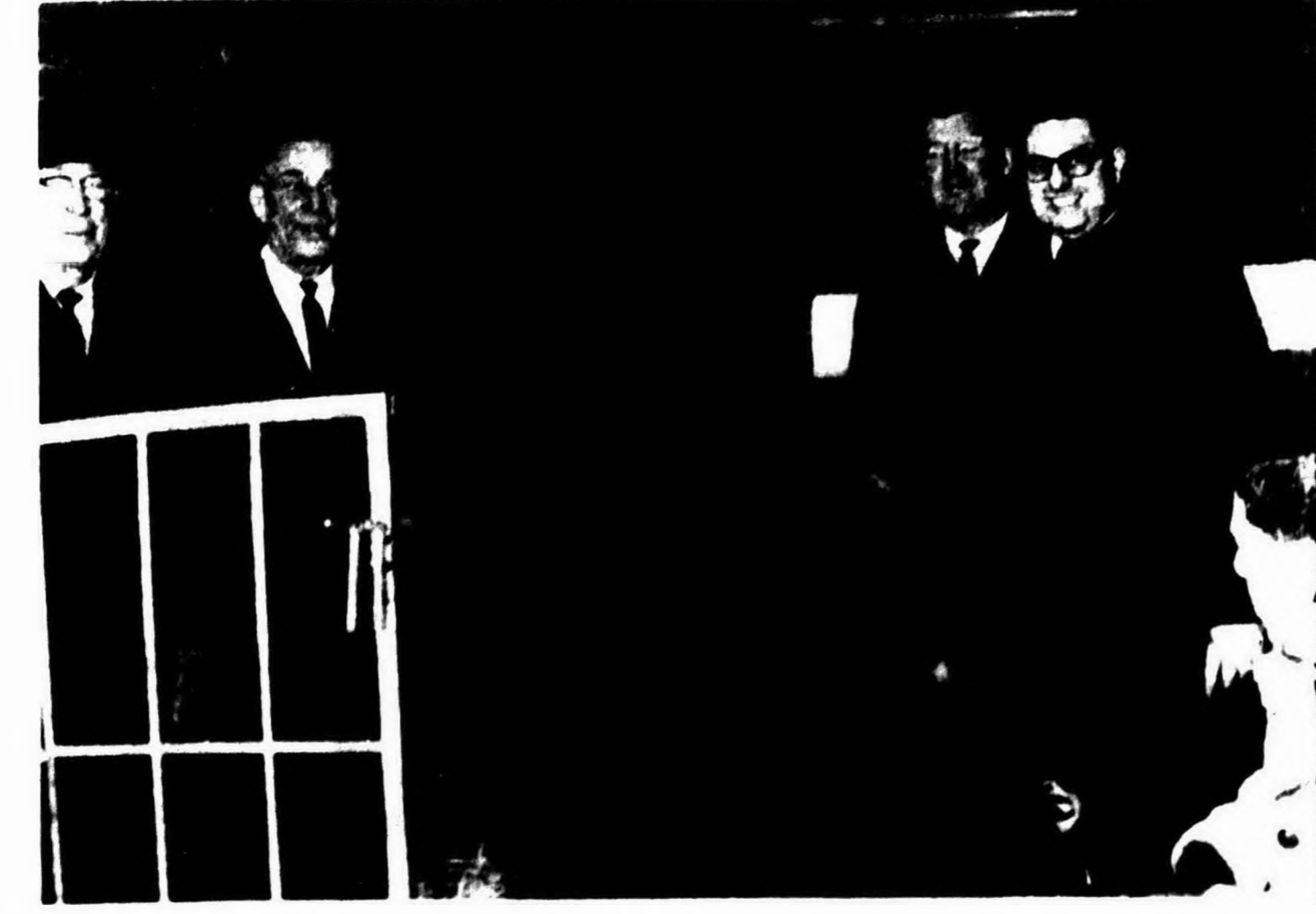

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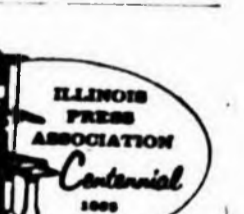

Some actions obviously are black and some are white, but there are so many in between, in the gray area. Here's where the jury has a rough time.

We dislike seeing a trooper badgered, when he is only doing his duty. Sure, there are "licket-happy" policemen who seemingly enjoy giving tickets for going 42 miles an hour in a 40 mile zone. This is in the gray area, where there could be an honest error on the part of either the trooper or the victim, but when a trooper must go 130 miles an hour to apprehend a driver doing 100 miles in a 70 mile zone on a busy highway, and the driver asks "What for?" when the trooper stops him and asks to see his license, and the trooper is questioned by the attorney, who asks if the trooper isn't merely "forming an opinion" when he tries to state the facts, this would seem to us outside the gray area far outside, and into the definite realm of black.

Then when a slip of the tongue by a witness can throw a case that has already required 60 "man hours" of jury time, out of court on grounds of a mistrial, we think something is wrong. Oh, it's legal, without a doubt, but it isn't right. One defendant had wanted to know what he had to do to retrieve his driver's license. Alert jurors realized a person wouldn't likely be deprived of his license on his first traffic violation. When the witness inadvertently let slip the words "third violation," the defense lawyer gleefully jumped to his feet, shouting his request for a mistrial.

A trooper is hired to check traffic and issue tickets for violations. As serious an offense as driving 100 miles an hour on a busy highway, making the lives of other motorists; the work of the lawyers seeking the facts in the case; calling witnesses; assembling of 12 jurors; all can be brushed aside on a technicality, because a witness mentioned "third" offense.

Law is a strange thing. All 12 jurors were asked if they had ever been in court for traffic violations or any member of their family had, but it was unforgeivable on the part of a witness to mention that the defendant was up for his third violation.

Don't get us wrong. We have great respect and admiration for the legal profession and the men who receive their hard earned law

degrees. To pass the lawyer's bar examination is just as difficult as becoming a medical doctor or college professor.

But one lawyer facetiously remarked, he felt the court was being turned into a three ring circus and he didn't like the idea of being a ring master. We tend to agree with his comment.

In this day of modern stenographic machines, computers, visual aids, and tape recorders, one would expect more up-to-date procedures in court, yet they plod along at a leisurely pace as they did in horse and buggy days, having changed but little from the time when Abraham Lincoln and Stephen Douglas practiced law. The court still travels with the speed of a circuit riding lawyer even in dealing with cases concerning alleged violations at 100 miles an hour.

It is frustrating for jurors to drive miles, day after day, sit idly by while 12 others are called and questioned, and eventually be dismissed to drive home again. It makes one wonder, do the "mills" have to grind so slowly and does the "grit" have to be so exceedingly small?

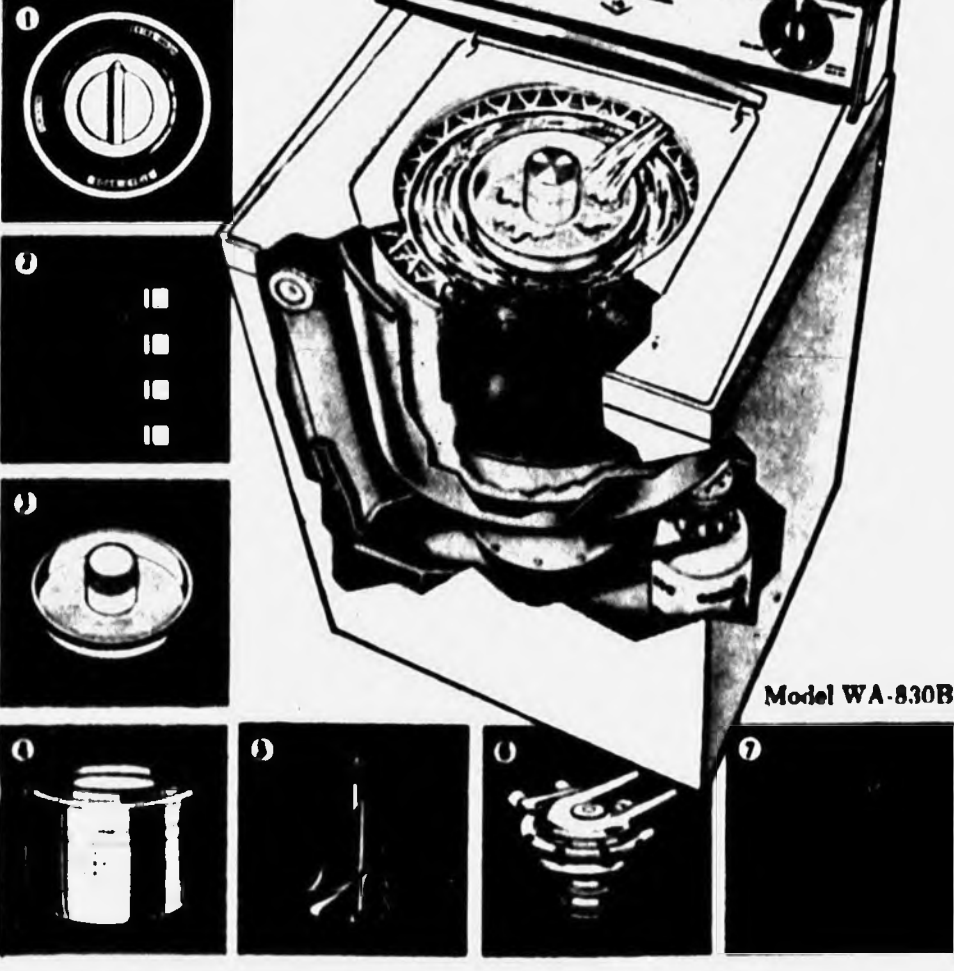

## Minute Message On AGRONOMY Roots & Sub-Soils

No. Four  
Of A Series

In corn production we are continually concerned and aware of what happens to the stalk and the ear. Little do we realize what happens to the corn roots.

The adage "a plant is no stronger than its foundation" is certainly true. Scientifically expressed the adage becomes: every increase in yield is caused by a direct proportional increase in root growth. Otherwise for every bushel more yield there is an equal increase in root development.

One reason phosphorus is so important in corn yields is phosphorus stimulates root growth. More root growth in turn picks up more phosphorus resulting in more root growth then more phosphorus, more growth, etc. A greater corn yield is the end result.

We are all familiar with deep and shallow rooted crops as alfalfa, corn, and soybeans. It is interesting to know corn roots as deep as alfalfa. In observing rooting depths of alfalfa and corn agronomists discovered we really have deep and shallow rooted soils rather than deep and shallow rooted crops. In an unrestricted subsoil corn will, if necessary, root down as far as 5-6 feet. Hardly a shallow or intermediate rooting depth! This ability of corn roots to penetrate the subsoil for fertility and moisture is a better method of judging soils than the color of the topsoil. The brighter yellow the clay the better the corn roots can penetrate the subsoil. Hence subsoil color is an outstanding guide to soil productivity.

The rooting pattern of corn itself is an interesting study. For the first week or two in a corn plant's life corn roots grow in a downward diagonal direction. When corn is knee-high few roots are in the top 6" of the soil. Roots from adjoining rows have met by this time, however, at the 6" 15" depth.

After this knee high stage the centers between the rows become filled with roots. As each whorl of roots start from the next highest node (joint) on the stalk and root down till they hit other roots, the top 15" between the rows is filled with roots from the bottom up.

At tasseling time penetration of roots to their maximum depth occurs. This is followed by the completion of the brace root system. The end result is a complete network of roots in the soil.

**Flavor — That Special Something**  
It's amazing how the simplest food can become a feast when you add a bit of spices and herbs. Seasonings are used around the world in great variety and amounts. When skillfully used, spices and herbs heighten the aroma and taste of everyday foods and pique lazy appetites. Add seasoners with a light hand at first. Here's one rule-of-thumb: if you can tell the herb or spice by the tasting, you've probably added too much.

**White Elephants**

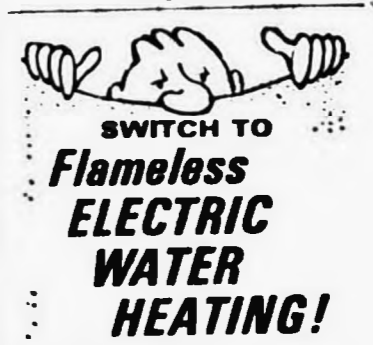
